Prevention is Key to a Strong & Healthy Community

In November, the Cleveland Department of Public Health in partnership with researchers at Case Western Reserve Unviersity made COVID data available by zip code. The map serves as a stark reminder of the inequities that exist between Cleveland's different neighborhoods. Hough, and a bit of Glenville, in the 44106 zip code has the highest number of COVID deaths for its population size. While other zip codes are starting to see their number of new COVID cases drop, Hough's numbers are still rising. This trend follows other health inequities in Hough, most notably a higher infant mortality rate and higher lead levels in children under six compared to other neighborhoods in Cleveland. "We are at the two-year mark in the COVID-19 global pandemic. The disparity we see with higher COVID-19 deaths in our community is a reminder, that we are combating more than just a virus," said new Ward 7 Councilwoman Stephanie Howse, "We have to collectively work to address the social determinants of health, while staying focused on removing barriers to access COVID-19 vaccines and healthcare providers that can answer questions and concerns for our neighbors." Across the City as a whole, nearly half of COVID deaths are among the African American population. The surest way to protect yourself from severe COVID symptoms and death is to get vaccinated.

Famicos senior residents, along with Maintenance Tech Anthony Cornett, register to get their booster vaccines at a pop-up clinic at Famicos' Main Office (January 2022). The clinic was offered in partnership with the Ohio National Guard and the Western Reserve Area Agency on Aging.

Since March 2021, Famicos has facilitated almost 900 vaccines in the African American and Asian communities in Cleveland. Famicos has received funding from the CDC Foundation and the Local Initiatives Support Corporation (LISC) for our vaccine efforts. Famicos has partnered with organizations like Case Western Reserve University and the Cuyahoga Department of Public Health to host pop-up vaccine clinics in Glenville and Hough. We have also partnered with fellow CDC Foundation grantees Asian Services in Action (ASIA) and the Cleveland Minority Organ and Tissue Transplant Education Program (MOTTEP) to further our reach. "ASIA did some translations for our vaccine video series and we always have MOTTEP's vaccine ambassadors at our clinics to answer any questions people might have about the vaccine," said Director of Marketing Tara Mowery. In 2020, Famicos Foundation started a new line of business, Homeownership Resource Center (HRC). Candice Wood joined Famicos in May 2021 as Manager of the HRC. With over 20 years as a licensed realtor, Candice is also a HUD-certified Housing Counselor and Mortgage Loan Originator. The HRC assists clients on their path to homeownership by providing homebuyer education and counseling. HRC also provides financial education, classes on basic home maintenance, and assistance to people in emergency housing situations such as foreclosure and eviction.

Candice's goal for the Homeownership Resource Center is for it to evolve into a comprehensive housing resource for the community. "Everyone deserves an opportunity to become a homeowner and to be provided support and education along their journey," she says. Expanding the capabilities of HRC, Famicos recently hired additional staff with experience in providing homeownership counseling. Keith Davis and Jason Jackson will be joining on as Homeownership Counselors, while Lisette Lopez will be joining as the Program & Intake Specialist for HRC. Famicos Foundation has also been awarded several grants by the City of Cleveland, NeighborWorks America, and Cuyahoga County that will be used for housing stability, tech upgrades, and finalizing HUD certification for the organization. "We're excited to be able to expand the services of HRC county-wide!"

Excitement fills the air as children at Famicos' Park Village Apartments enter the community center on a cold December morning. They select items from the table and a bag full of toys to be opened on Christmas. Famicos' annual Christmas Toy Giveaway has taken place for years. The giveaway allows children the opportunity to receive Christmas gifts, who might not get any otherwise. The children range in age from toddlers all the way through teenagers. The toys and winter coats are provided through Toys for Tots, Shoes and Clothes 4 Kids, the Cleveland Police Foundation, and private donors. We especially want to thank Dick Clough of the Police Foundation for making this year's event so special. This year, Famicos received 3,300 toys and 100 winter coats. Famicos staff and volunteers had to quickly categorizes the toys,

put them into gift bags and deliver them. This year presents were distributed at two apartment buildings and to families throughout Glenville and Hough.

The annual Christmas Toy Giveaway is organized by the **Community Building and Engagement Department** (CB&E) at Famicos. In years past, the Toy Giveaway included a Christmas party as well, where children would get a special visit from Santa Claus. With the pandemic, CB&E has had to change that aspect of the event, but their dedication to providing children with Christmas gifts has remained. CB&E Director Erica Burnett said, "The most rewarding part is seeing the look on the children's faces and providing for those who need it."

Digital Inclusion for Seniors

A digital divide runs through Cleveland. It has existed in our communities, our neighborhoods, and our schools for decades. As the world becomes increasingly more digital, bridging the gap has become critical. Shabreese Murphy knows this barrier well and is passionate about helping others to bridge this divide. Shabreese is the new Neighbor to Neighbor Community Engagement Specialist at Famicos Foundation. Neighbor to Neighbor is a door-to-door canvassing program with a goal of building trust and developing relationships with community residents around digital access, literacy and other quality of life issues. Shabreese has been recruiting and training community ambassadors, and working to connect residents with resources.

The Neighbor to Neighbor program is sponsored by the Rocket Mortgage, Cleveland Neighborhood

Progress, and the Cleveland Foundation. Famicos' broader Digital Inclusion program is also funded by OCCH, Huntington Bank, the McGregor Foundation, the Sam J. Frankino Foundation, and the Fred A. Lennon Charitable Trust. Famicos is offering classes to senior residents to learn how to use tablets. The students keep the tablets after they complete the class. "We have become a digital society and it is important that all individuals are able to participate in accessing information and communication technologies," said Shabreese. "The less educated, individuals with lower incomes, seniors, and persons with disabilities are some of the least likely to participate in our digital society. Technology should be accessible and affordable to all, especially these vulnerable populations. Making sure underserved and disadvantaged populations have access to affordable internet, devices, and digital literacy skills training will help to bridge the digital divide."

Seniors Mary Morris and Patricia Hinton participated in a recent class and received tablets. Morris said she took the class due to the increasing reliance on tech in society. "I needed a little more experience with computers. Things are going to be more digital now." Morris shared she plans to use what she learned during the class to manage her prescriptions, social security, and is looking forward to playing Wheel of Fortune on her new tablet.
